PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Today I am pondering verses from scripture for the first Sunday of Advent such as:

“O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence—From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him.” Isaiah 64

“Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved.” Psalm 80

“Jesus said, ‘In those days, after that suffering, the sound will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken...But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father.’” Mark 13

We will hear these words on the first Sunday in Advent as we begin the forty day period of waiting for the coming of God in the incarnation. We are waiting for more than the baby, Jesus, we are actually waiting for the coming of Christ at the end of all time. This is when God will make all of creation and all creatures new. We will be healed of all the sin that ails us and makes living in relationship with God and with each other so difficult.

That difficulty certainly has been revealed in this notorious year of 2020. I find myself pondering this second coming with yearning, saying along with the Psalmist, “Stir up your power and come!” Here at the end of a very long and trying year it is tempting to feel stuck...stuck in the difficulty, the division, the social isolation of a pandemic. We hear Jesus describe the coming of the Son of Man with the sun and moon darkened, and stars falling from the heavens, etc. and it can sound like a dire and horrible warning. It may match our darker moods, but it certainly isn't something we would yearn for.

But, we do yearn for God to act on our behalf. We expect God to show up and show us what is expected of us as disciples. We pray for the discernment to set aside our dark mood, our doubts and fears so that we can see the way ahead.

We really look at the suffering of the people God loves and we want to be part of God's healing of creation. Here in Advent, as we prepare for the Christmas celebrations that we know and love which will probably be spent in a very different way than in the past, let's not lose hope. Let's ponder and pray about ways we can be part of bringing God's healing to our communities and out world.

I invite you to begin by praying this hymn:

"Rebuilding Starts with Weeping," can be sung to the tune of "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded" (Passion Chorale) by Amanda Udis-Kessler

“Rebuilding starts with weeping, with tears that fall like rain,
With full and honest grieving for years of loss and pain,
For suffering and sorrow that never had to be.
Rebuilding starts with weeping for all who are not free.

Rebuilding starts with praying, with hopes allowed a voice,
With visions for our country, with reason to rejoice.
We offer up our spirits, our hearts and minds and hands.
Rebuilding starts with praying for strength to heal our land.

Rebuilding starts with loving, with care for every soul,
With yearning in compassion that all may yet be whole,
That enemy and neighbor may know a better day.
Rebuilding starts with loving, for love will show the way.”

The CRISIS of CHRISTMAS¹

Dear Members and Friends of the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin,

Christmas 2020 will occur while we are living through of a series of crises. Here's the list: the pandemic, economic losses, protests against racial injustices, an ongoing climate crisis, and a divided country following a contentious presidential election. I'm not going to lie, it's been stressful for me, and I imagine it has been for you, too. As Christians, we have been moving through these crisis-filled days with the expectation that God is present and God's promises

are true. We move forward with hope.

The two Chinese characters for the word "crisis," 危机, have often been translated as "danger" and "opportunity." Others say that a better translation is "danger" and "change point." What dangers do you see as your congregation moves toward celebrating the Birth of our Savior - Christmas - in a totally new way? What "opportunities" or "change points" do you see that could propel your church forward in a positive way into God's future?

Mary experienced a theological crisis when the angel Gabriel revealed to her God's plan to enter this world by the baby in her womb. Mary's body was the center of a theological crisis² - much like the theological crisis caused by a virus that has invaded the bodies of our loved ones, and the theological crisis of abused and broken black and brown bodies, and the theological crisis experienced in the misuse of this planet on which all bodies live. Where is God in the crisis? What does this mean?

In a crisis, God comes to us. John 1:1,14 *In the beginning was the Word... and the Word was God...And the Word became flesh and lived among us.* Jesus is God, divine *and* human. God took up residence and moved into our neighborhood. God goes where God's people go and is who the people are.³ This is the theological promise of John's gospel. God is present with us in our times of crisis and suffering. This is the foundation of Luther's theology of the cross.

God is revealed through the crisis of Mary's pregnancy and Jesus' untimely birth in a Bethlehem barn. God is revealed in the crucifixion; through the body of Jesus, hanging on a cross. God is revealed through the risen body of Jesus on Easter Morning.

No matter how different Christmas is for you this year, no matter what crisis arises, God is there, present as promised, in the WORD made flesh. May the story of Jesus' birth bring you much needed joy and hope this holiday season and may the presence of God comfort you in the new year.

Georgetown/Trinity Joint Council Meeting

November 17, 2020

Meeting was held via conference call.

Members present: Steven Anderson (TR president), Tim Frendt (GT president), Robin Denver, Gretchen Frendt, Pastor Diane House, Tom Levi, Roberta Hansen (GT Treasurer), John Gall, Sherry Doornick, Kathy Grenquist (TR Treasurer), Jody Benfit, JoAnn Sellent, Christine Anderson (TR secretary), Stephanie Fansler, Judy Gammel, Keith Ward. **Absent:** Denis Wiese, Debbie Wickstrom

Meeting called to order by Georgetown President, Tim Frendt
Opened with devotions and prayer led by Pastor Diane House.
Past minutes were read aloud by Christine Anderson. Motion to approve the minutes as written was made by Sherry Doornick and seconded by JoAnn Sellent. Minutes approved.

Old Business:

Steve Hansen has agreed to look at the egress window in the parsonage to see about finishing it off.

New Business:

Annual Review discussion:

Council discussed together things that were going well and areas for improvement for the future. We considered items from the constitution in the area of Worship/Mutual Ministry, Care for the needs of the congregation and Responding to needs of our communities. The flexibility of each congregation to change and experiment throughout the pandemic have been positives. The councils asked about ways to support our pastor during this stressful time. Strategies for reaching out to congregation members without internet connections were also discussed. We all need to continue to think creatively in our current situation.

Pastor Salary for 2021:

Given the pandemic's potential influence on giving, the council discussed no salary increase for 2021. Other benefits (health insurance, pension, vacation, continuing education, etc) would remain the same. Pastor Diane supported this decision. Gretchen Frendt made a motion that pastor's salary have no increase for 2021. Seconded by Robin Denver. Motion carried.

Shared Budget questions:

Questions about the shared internet and phone costs were discussed. Roberta and Kathy will provide a summary of how that expense is currently working. This will help Trinity's council in deciding how to set up internet at Trinity.

Worship:

Thank you to Gretchen Frendt and Sherry Doornick for their continued work on the Facebook Live worship services!

Councils decided to move to all virtual worship. Covid is moving quickly through our communities and we need to do the best we can to contain it. The councils looked at the Wisconsin Health department/Badger Bounce Back plan and the White House gathering criteria for opening and both contain 14 day reduction in new cases as a step to re-opening. Therefore, the councils will watch for this criteria and then consider next possible steps. This means, it is very unlikely there will be no in-person Christmas worship.

Copying worship onto a DVD may be an option for those without internet. Gretchen will look into this.

Advent/Christmas:

- Councils discussed ways to provide worship experiences for families to use virtually, as well as a possible drive-through nativity display.
- Advent kits will be assembled and delivered to families with children and those with no internet resources.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by JoAnn Sellent/Sherry Doornick. Meeting adjourned.
